#### Statement of attendance policy

### Instructor-specific attendance policy:

- Students are <u>expected</u> to attend class each class day, and attendance will be taken each class day.
- The student is responsible for all material covered in class, both course content and announcements, whether present or not.
- Participation points will accrue at the rate of 1 point per full week of on-time attendance. Students with full attendance will be awarded an additional 15 points (i.e., the full 30 points); one absence, an additional 10 points; two absences, an additional 5 points.
- Attendance implies readiness to learn more about the course content; students who sleep in class will be asked to leave, with loss of attendance credit for the day.
- If you are absent, if affects only you; if you are late, you disrupt the entire class. The instructor reserves the right to refuse entrance to students who repeatedly arrive after class has started.
- Exams will be taken with your specific section.
- Absence from one exam will be made up ONLY through a comprehensive final, in addition to the last regular exam, during period scheduled for the regular final exam (both exams to be taken within the 2-hour period). Absence from a second (or third) exam will NOT be made up.
- Students failing to attend class for the <u>entire</u> session(s) of group presentations will forfeit 50 points of the project grade.

## Policy on use of cell phone or other electronic devices:

The use by students of cell phones, pagers, or similar communication devices during scheduled classes is prohibited. All such devices must be turned off or put in a silent mode and cannot be taken out during class. At the discretion of the instructor, exception to this policy is possible in special circumstances.
