## Course Syllabus: MGT 447-647 International Management Section 301/Spring 2007

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Course Objectives: This course examines the impact of the intercultural/international environments on management functions through classroom instruction, discussion, and case studies.

There are three primary objectives of the course:

- 1. To introduce to the institutions, vocabulary, and players in the world of international business. You need to be able to speak the language of international business to operate effectively.
- 2. To provide the opportunity to (begin to) understand different cultures and implications this has for managers. Understanding different people and cultures will lead to a greater understanding of ourselves and the culture in which we live.
- 3. To gain experience in analyzing the environment in a foreign context. You should know key sources for researching the cultural, economic and political environments and anticipate the influence each will have on managing strategies and decision-making.

Text Material: Richard M. Hodgetts, Fred Luthens, and Jonathan P. Doh. 2006, *International Management: Culture, Strategy, and Behavior*, 6<sup>th</sup> edition (McGraw-Hill, Inc.) will provide the basic framework for this course. In addition, a subscription to one of these publications is expected: *The Wall Street Journal, Business Week*, and/or *Fortune*.

Research Project: Required for graduate credit (MGT 647). See details on accompanying "Case Study Project Guidelines". Case/Article Report will be explained by the Instructor.

Performance Evaluation: The 90-80-70-60% system will be used in assigning letter grades A-B-C-D-F, based on performance in the following tentative activities/factors.

A course grade will be based on performance on examinations, written project for MGT 647 students, Article Report for all students, attendance and class participation. Examinations may consist of essays, problems, and objective questions on material covered in text material, lectures, and any other assignments. Performance evaluation will be based on your comprehension of the subject. The related criteria include completeness, organization, presentation, accuracy, and neatness of relevant work.

Due Date/ Late Work/ Make-Up Examination: All assignments and examinations are to be completed at the designated times. In extenuating circumstances, based upon supporting documentation, the instructor will decide the eligibility, nature, and due date of missed work. Eligibility for make-up is not automatic; clear with the instructor in advance.

Attendance / Late Arrival / Early Departure / Class Participation: The University's attendance policy can be found in the 2006-2007 Undergraduate Catalog and at <a href="http://www.missouristate.edu/recreg/attendan.html">http://www.missouristate.edu/recreg/attendan.html</a>. According to University guidelines, class attendance and course grade are demonstrably and positively related; therefore, "the University expects students to attend all class sessions of courses in which they are enrolled." And, attendance and class participation are essential for the successful completion of this course. Absences will be recorded beginning the first day of classes. As an incentive, there is a 10-point "perfect attendance" bonus (zero absence, no exception). Bonus points shall not increase base points, but could raise earned points. A unit of absence is equivalent to the standard class time, that is, 50 minutes. Absences exceeding three units will result in a penalty of 10 points per unit of absence (see accompanying table). Other practices tantamount to absences include late arrival, early departure, sleeping in class, completing assignments for other courses, and disruptive behavior in class. Provide documentation regarding extenuating circumstances for consideration and action regarding absence penalty.
